Abstract: This article analyzes the theme of collective memory in three Portuguese novels published in 1982 in light of Eduardo Lourenço's observation that national identity is based on a "reactualização incessante do que fomos em função do que somos hoje ou queremos ser amanhâ." In Balada da Praia dos Cães, by José Cardoso Pires, the author revisits a period that has been repressed by the country's collective memory-that of Salazarist oppression-so as to judge the crimes committed by the Estado Novo; in José Saramago's Memorial do Convento, the narrator unmasks the supposed objectivity of history, which is presented in the novel as nothing more than one of several means of interpreting the past. In contrast with these two novels, Lídia Jorge, in O Cais das Merendas, does not attempt to "correct" earlier views of the nation's past. On the contrary, she opts to portray various post-revolutionary problems associated with cultural and economic modernity, thereby comme! nting on the difficulty of preserving a collective memory when faced with the ruptures that occurred with the Portuguese Revolution.
